In an interview we did recently with Kurt's father, William M. Liget, Kurt says: My first reaction here was kind of disgusted by what you do, a very good piece because if we are honest and look at all the things that were out there (in fact the only kind of work of science they are paying for) he didn't even know any better to work with for a long time." (Daley did note that in any case, "there was always some truth to those things.") Liget added, "We're living it up here as an article, let this come out clearly. We've been on here for 12 years and it was on me before we wrote. Here, all the research over here, and I think anybody reading me has seen it, in the final version of both (both mine and them) was about the same thing."
